SWEETHEART CINNAMON ROLLS!

Everyone loves a good cinnamon roll so why not make them into the shape of a heart.

We swear they taste even better shaped like hearts!

INGREDIENTS:

- 1 package refrigerated pizza dough
- ½ cup cinnamon sugar (½ cup sugar, 2 Tbs cinnamon)
- Maple syrup (optional)

DIRECTIONS:

- 1. Preheat oven to 400°F. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper or a nonstick baking mat.
- 2. Unroll pizza dough into a rectangle on a work surface. Sprinkle cinnamon sugar evenly across.
- 3. Using your fingertips, roll up the long edge halfway, and repeat on the second long edge. The two rolls should now be touching.
- 4. Using a sharp knife, cut the roll into 1-inch segments. Place them face-up on the baking sheet.
- 5. Bake 15-20 minutes until golden brown. Remove from oven. Serve and enjoy.

COMMUNICATION FIND YOUR SOULMATE


